## B.M.G. Banjo Methods

HEN one commences research in preparation for compiling a history of any instrument, it is always helpful (and interesting) to attempt to compile a complete list of the published methods (tutors) and books of studies devoted to the said instrument.

In my researches for gathering material for eventual writing of "The Story of the Banjo" the list of methods published in America alone has already become a formidable one—and it is still far from complete. In the hope that American readers may be able to supply additional data and, perhaps, point out mistakes and omissions in the list so far compiled, I am printing what I have so far unearthed.

Some readers may find this list of little interest but even a perfunctory glance through it will surely prove that the banjo has merited a vast library of instruction books and shows how the banjo started to be taken seriously, as a musical instrument, when tutors began to be published for it. The list also shows, to the interested, how advancing techniques brought forth new works to enable players and would-be players to benefit from the pioneer work of true musicians and the new and better instruments coming on the market. Then, as fashions changed (i.e. first the adoption of C Notation and then the advent of the plectrum-banjo and the

tenor-banjo), the list reflects the increasing demand for instruction books.

Perhaps it should be mentioned that the first banjo tutors published in America were written for the instrument to be tuned D'. G. D. F#. A.—nearly an octave below the instrument's present pitch. Eventually, with the introduction of thinner and better-quality strings (and the subsequent shortening of the banjo's neck) the pitch was raised to:—



and it was then the strings were conveniently given the names by which they remained to be called in America even when the pitch was finally raised to:—



Hard as it may be to believe at the present time, the Americans continued to use the A Notation in all their Methods and music. In other words, whilst the banjoist would play C on his instrument he would read A on his music! Some years later a student was quoted as asking at his first lesson: "Why do we tune the A string to C and call it A? Why are the F. C. and G. sharped, although the key is C which has no sharp signature, and you call it A, which has?"

It was not until well into the present century that the Americans adopted the system of writing C for C. Gradually the A Notation began to disappear and some Methods were transcribed and reprinted.

For the interested I reproduce on this page a few bars of Morley's "Spread Eagle March" in both American (A) and English (C) notation. (We



in England have always written the music as it sounded!) It should be emphasised that both these versions of the same melody sounded the same in

pitch!

In the following list the publisher (where known) is indicated in brackets. Some of the exact publication dates are unknown, although I have been able to narrow down the possibility to the year given. In such cases the letter 'c' (circa -about) precedes the date. If any reader is able to give the precise year of publication the information would be invaluable.
